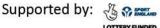

	All children have an understanding of self-rescue and practised techniques, as well as taking part in some taster diving sessions.

Have you used it in this way?	We had budgeted for potentially 6 pupils to have 5 top up sessions at £4.25 per session = £127.50 plus transport for 5 visits = £1000 (approx.). However, Plymouth Life Centre could not facilitate this.
	In our bid to move swimming lessons to Y4, Y6 and Y5 will swim in 2022/23.
	Y6 in September and Y5 in May.
	Eventually, this will enable us to move swimming to Year 4 to give the time for top up sessions where necessary and ensure more children are able to pass the NC expectation at a younger age.

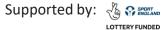

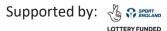
